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FROM THE PASTOR

"Don't have anything to do with foolish and stupid arguments, because you know they produce quarrels. And the Lord's servant must not quarrel; instead, he must be kind to everyone, able to teach, not resentful. Those who oppose him he must gently instruct, in the hope that God will grant them repentance leading them to a knowledge of the truth, and that they will come to their senses and escape from the trap of the devil, who has taken them captive to do his will." (2 Timothy 2:23-26)

I believe that Christians are the most *overtly* persecuted religious group in the United States. Don't believe me? Here's a field test. Let's say you decide to run for local public office. During your campaign, you make it very clear that you are a practicing Buddhist, and even more, that it is the very bedrock of your life. I don't think anyone would question your sanity, or ability to serve the needs of your constituents, based solely on your religious practices. Now let's say you run for office as a practicing Christian. I may be wrong, but I think religion would become fair game for public criticism -- at least in this part of the country.

And what about the media? I don't think I need to convince you of their bias against Christianity. How many movies and T.V. shows have depicted Christians as intolerant, aggressive and ignorant? How many celebrities have openly attacked the Christian faith as a catalyst for war, discrimination and hate-speech?

I could cite numerous examples, as I'm sure you could, regarding our cultural shift away from Christianity and toward *anything* else. We simply live in a day and age that assumes if you're a Christian, you have a *lot* of explaining to do. America simply wants nothing to do with Christianity. And you know what? *I don't blame them.*

Christians seem to have more exposure (and political power) than ever before. Think about all the best-selling books, the explosion of Christian music, *The Passion of the Christ*, the *Chronicles of Narnia*, Christian cable stations, T.V. preachers, etc.

So why do people hate us so much? Because, while the *exposure* to Christian media is way up, the *quality* of the messages we're sending is a bit suspect. The airwaves are *filled* with some pretty crazy things being said and done in the name of Jesus Christ. And most of the time, when I see Christians in the public arena, *they're yelling or arguing about something*.

Why would anyone think Christianity is attractive, relevant, or God's saving Truth? Instead of living our lives by "loving God," and "loving others" (The Greatest Commandment), it seems we're always trying to win some public debate. Where is the *joyful Christian life*? We Christians seem to talk a good game about joy, but don't experience it in everyday life.

As Paul puts it in his letter to Timothy, "the Lord's servant must not quarrel" because it only drives people away. Now that's not to say that public debate is never important. Of course, we know it's *sometimes* necessary. But if we spent more time worrying about living a life that imitated Christ, we would surely have a bigger impact on our country than we do by constantly arguing.

A couple years ago, my cousin was visiting from California. She is a brilliant young woman who I don't know real well but respect very much. She's not a Christian (or at least wasn't at the time), but she asked me about my faith. I told her of my conversion and how Christ changed my life. Later in the evening, we started getting into "debates" over human sexuality, salvation through other religions, etc. And at the end of the night, we were both frustrated, red-faced, and honestly, much farther apart in our beliefs than we were a few hours before. She even told me, "Jason, I believed you more when you told me how your faith changed your life, not when you tried to convince me with how much you *know*."

I have never forgotten that night. And I wish I could do it differently. But all I can do now is learn from it. The bottom line is that the power of our faith doesn't come from words; it comes from our *transformed lives*.

This is *exactly* our focus here at Avenel Church right now. As we explore how to live our lives "wide open" for God, we must first understand what God is calling us to do. And that comes through spending time with God in prayer and study. Our Adult Sunday School class will continue to meet at 9:00 a.m. in Ken Hunt Lounge through the month of October. It's a series called "Faith Seeking Understanding," a 13-week class that is covering the major doctrines of the Christian faith. And, for those who can't make Sunday morning, there is a Wednesday Bible Study at 7:00 p.m. in Jacob Morgan Hall on Paul's letter to the *Romans*. Please feel free to come as often as you like.

May God continue to move and guide us by the power of the Holy Spirit to live our *transformed lives* for the world to see. Let's move beyond "quarrelling" and move toward living the joyful Christian life. May God bless you and your family this month.



August 2009 Session Meeting Highlights



The following is a summary of some of the actions taken at the August 25, 2009 regular Session meeting:

- Approved a resolution and the format for a Promissory Note to be issued when a loan is made to the church as part of the Capital Campaign.
- Approved a recommendation from the Outreach and Evangelism Committee that a Christmas Luncheon and Choir Concert be held on December 20, 2009 following worship.
- Approved several recommendations from the Christian Education Committee including allowing Pastor Tucker to lead an Adult Sunday School class and a Wednesday night Bible Study class, allowing Dawn Connolly to organize a "Night in Bethlehem" event on December 13, 2009, allowing Jackie Turnbull to establish a Mommy and Me group, and having Chris and Carrie D'Amato lead the Mid-Level Fellowship group.
- Also approved a recommendation from Christian Education to allow Pastor Tucker to lead a youth mission trip to New Castle, Pennsylvania next July 18-24, 2010.
- Reviewed the status of the manse renovation project and related work to the church property.

Property Care Newsletter

October 2009

Our Committee's major focus continued to be the preparation/renovation of the Church Manse for our pastor, the Rev. Jason P. Tucker and his family. Activities slowed during the month of August as the financial options to cover the associated costs were addressed by our Finance Committee. The current status and noteworthy developments are:

Contractor – Paul's Tile & Construction should begin working on the Manse at the end of September, pending work permit approval by the township.

Sewer Line – Session has approved to award the contract to Accurate to install two sewer lines -- one for Head Start and one for the Manse. Work is scheduled to also begin at the end of September or early October.

Insulation – To make the Manse more energy efficient, insulation will be added to the living room and dining room ceilings (currently not insulated). After a competitive bidding process, the work was

awarded to Quality Insulation.

Fence – A fence will be installed for the side and backyard of the manse to add security and to discourage people from cutting through the property. A work party* will be organized to install the fence. Note: the fencing will not be installed until AFTER the sewer line is completed.

***Work Parties** are being formed to address various remaining projects tied to readying the Manse for occupancy by Jason & his family. In addition to the fencing installation mentioned above, help will be needed for finishing the rear porch, painting inside the Manse (including the basement) and landscaping around the Manse. Sign-up sheets are at the rear of the sanctuary. Persons signing up will be contacted when the work is scheduled. Please come join us in helping to complete these tasks.

Other noteworthy work and ongoing assignments:

- **Sign** – The old sanctuary sign will be installed outside of the CE Building, adjacent to the main entrance.
- **Security** - Alarm Systems are being looked into for both the CE Building and the Manse. A security camera option is also being looked into for monitoring the CE Building/Office entrances. This option would be a one-time cost that could provide remote monitoring through a personal computer(s).
- **Gym** – Estimates are being obtained for repairing the gym roof, including the option of pricing out the materials to repair it ourselves. This is a very big job and would require ten to twelve men if we were to do the work ourselves.
- **Weekly Lawn Maintenance** – Too few have been taking care of our church grounds. HELP is needed to spread out the workload. While a sign-up sheet is at the rear of the sanctuary, anyone is welcome to join us on Saturday mornings (9:30 a.m. to noon). As mentioned before, it's just as good as heading to the gym – **it's great exercise!** 😊
- **Fall Clean-Up** is scheduled for Saturday, November 21, 2009 beginning at 9 a.m.

These are just a sample of the projects being worked on by the Committee. **Again, anyone interested in volunteering, even on a part-time or project-related basis, contact any Committee member to join.**

The Fish Hospitality Program

The FISH Hospitality Program, an affiliate of Family Promise, gives us the opportunity to welcome and care for women and families, improving their lives one week at a time. It is a tri-county program serving Middlesex, Union and Somerset Counties in New Jersey. Avenel Presbyterian Church is one of 15 host congregations serving the tri-county area.

From January 1, 2009 thru June 30, 2009, these 15 host congregations sheltered 23 family units for a total of 46 persons. The number of adults was 26 and the number of children was 20. Guests normally stay for a period of 6 months then move into their own housing.

There are many success stories because of this program and your help. Success is only possible when we all work together as volunteers. As volunteer Catherine Stanford from the Christ United Methodist Church of Piscataway said, "Being a volunteer with FISH Hospitality has given me a very real and specific opportunity to accompany my neighbors when they are in need. I have grown in spiritual maturity as I have practiced following Christ in this simple task."

PASTOR APPRECIATION

Appreciate your pastoral leaders who gave you the Word of God. Take a good look at the way they live, and let their faithfulness instruct you, as well as their truthfulness. Hebrews 13:7 (MSG)

Pastor Appreciation Month is October, and Pastor Appreciation Sunday is always the second Sunday in October, this year Sunday, October 11, 2009.

Below are excerpts from an article by Victor Parachin appearing in the September/October 1999 issue of *Today's Christian* entitled "8 Ways to Encourage Your Pastor."

Sometimes pastors are the loneliest people in the church. Often their hours are long, the pay minimal, the criticism considerable and constant. Feelings of disappointment, discouragement and defeat may begin to plague the best of them.

Paul's admonition to "serve one another in love" (Gal. 5:13) should encourage us to remember our shepherds. Here are eight ways to make their lives better:

1. **Cut the Criticism** – Unlike most workers who are evaluated once or twice a year, clergy are often critiqued weekly after each worship service. It's not unusual to hear people say that the music was poor, the hymn selection was awful, or the sermon was boring. We would do well to remember that most spiritual leaders work hard to make worship a unique celebration each week.
2. **Pray Regularly** – Ask God to shower your pastor with an abundance of love, hope, joy, faith, peace, power, wisdom and courage. Pray for your spiritual leader's maturity and growth in the faith.
3. **Express Appreciation in Writing** – A spoken compliment is always welcome, but a written one can be read over and over again for years. So when you hear or see something you like from your minister, write an appreciative note.
4. **Use Your Skills to Bless** – Are you proficient with computers? Help your pastor master the church's new computer. Are you a mechanic? Offer to service the car free of charge or at a reduced fee. Whatever your skills, use them to help and bless.
5. **Squelch Gossip** – If you hear a negative comment, respond with a positive one. If misinformation is being spread, correct it with the accurate information. Or if people are gossiping, just walk away.
6. **Offer to Meet a Need** – Some people make their spiritual leaders defensive and angry by saying, "You need to..." That approach is seldom welcome and almost always counterproductive. If you see a need, approach your spiritual leader by saying, "I'd like to help by..." If you see an area that can be improved, take responsibility for working on it.
7. **Be Openly Responsive** – Nothing so animates and excites a spiritual leader as seeing people respond to the preaching and teaching. For example, a pastor's heart filled with joy when a group of women responded to a sermon he preached from the words of Jesus, "Do not judge, or you too will be judged" (Matthew 7:1). After hearing the sermon, the women decided to give a baby shower for the young woman who provided childcare while they met for Bible Study. She was unmarried, close to going on welfare and without support from her family or the father-to-be. The young woman was moved to tears by the surprise baby shower. Later, the women explained to the pastor, "Your sermon taught us that it's possible to reach out to someone in need – in this case an unwed mother – without judging or condoning the situation."
8. **Throw Away the Measuring Stick** – Don't expect that your present spiritual leaders will do things the same way their predecessors did. Lay aside personal agendas and preferences. Instead, focus on how your leader is being used by God to do effective ministry now. By serving your shepherds, you will ensure that they will not only be encouraged, but will feel appreciated and continue to minister with enthusiasm and energy.



Grandma's Hands

Grandma, some ninety plus years, sat feebly on the patio bench. She didn't move, just sat with her head down staring at her hands. When I sat down beside her she didn't acknowledge my presence and the longer I sat I wondered if she was OK.

Finally, not really wanting to disturb her but wanting to check on her at the same time, I asked her if she was OK. She raised her head and looked at me and smiled. "Yes, I'm fine, thank you for asking," she said in a clear strong voice.

"I didn't mean to disturb you, grandma, but you were just sitting here staring at your hands and I wanted to make sure you were OK," I explained to her.

"Have you ever looked at your hands," she asked. "I mean really looked at your hands?"

I slowly opened my hands and stared down at them. I turned them over, palms up and then palms down. No, I guess I had never really looked at my hands as I tried to figure out the point she was making. Grandma smiled and related this story:

"Stop and think for a moment about the hands you have, how they have served you well throughout your years. These hands, though wrinkled, shriveled and weak have been the tools I have used all my life to reach out and grab and embrace life.

"They braced and caught my fall when as a toddler I crashed upon the floor. They put food in my mouth and clothes on my back. As a child my mother taught me to fold them in prayer. They tied my shoes and pulled on my boots. They held my husband and wiped my tears when he went off to war.

"They have been dirty, scraped and raw, swollen and bent. They were uneasy and clumsy when I tried to hold my newborn son. Decorated with my wedding band they showed the world that I was married and loved someone special. They wrote my letters to him and trembled and shook when I buried my parents and spouse.

"They have held my children and grandchildren, consoled neighbors, and shook in fists of anger when I didn't understand.

"They have covered my face, combed my hair, and washed and cleansed the rest of my body. They have been sticky and wet, bent and broken, dried and raw. And to this day when not much of anything else of me works real well these hands hold me up, lay me down, and again continue to fold in prayer.

"These hands are the mark of where I've been and the ruggedness of life. But more importantly it will be these hands that God will reach out and take when he leads me home. And with my hands He will lift me to His side."

I will never look at my hands the same again. But I remember God reached out and took my grandma's hands and led her home.

When my hands are hurt or sore or when I stroke the face of my children and husband I think of grandma. I know she has been stroked and caressed and held by the hands of God.

"He is."



PRESBYTERIAN HIV/AIDS AWARENESS SUNDAY

It's a Matter of Faith

The fight against HIV/AIDS is about much more than distributing anti-retroviral drugs and condoms. For African churches, it's about delivering hope. Hope rooted in Jesus Christ. Hope arrives with a pastor who rides a bicycle to visit a dying patient. And with a home-based care volunteer carrying a backpack full of bandages. And with teachers who lead Bible studies that promote faithfulness and proclaim God's care.



Bicycles, backpacks, and Bible studies . . . unlikely but powerful tools in the church's battle against AIDS. DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS SUNDAY

Theological Statement

Violence is contrary to God's intentions for the world. This reality demands the response of the church in these days of increasing danger to vulnerable peoples – children, youth, women, disabled and the elderly. Interpreting biblical teachings and responding to the leadership of Jesus Christ in our lives calls the church to pastoral and moral response through an active program of advocacy and resourcing for transformation.

My heart is in anguish within me; the terrors of death have fallen on me. Fear and trembling have beset me; horror has overwhelmed me. I said, "Oh, that I had the wings of a dove! I would fly away and be at rest." Psalm 55:4-6

Elder Abuse: The Church Speaks

The following is from the Presbyterian Church (USA) policy, *Turn Mourning into Dancing! A Policy*

Statement on Healing Domestic Violence, approved by the 213th General Assembly (2001).

Physical Abuse of the elderly implies hitting, slapping, punching, pushing, shaking, biting, pulling hair, force-feeding and other willful acts that may result in bruises, lacerations, fractures or any other types of physical injury.

Emotional Abuse is the most prevalent form of elder abuse and includes name-calling, derogatory comments, the use of insults, harassment and threats or speaking to an elderly person in a childish or demeaning manner. Withholding affection, failing to provide a sense of security and the caregiver refusing to allow an elderly person access to family members and friends may also be considered emotional abuse.

Although **Sexual Abuse** is not as prevalent with the elderly as it is with children, it does occur. Sexual abuse of the elderly is defined as engaging in sexual acts with an elderly person by means of force, threat of force or without consent, including forcing an elderly person to perform sexual acts on the perpetrator.

Financial Abuse is defined as the misappropriation or stealing of an elderly person's finances or personal possessions. The elderly can be victimized financially by family members, individuals hired as caregivers, or by companies taking advantage of a potential elderly customer. This form of abuse can have permanently devastating effects because it impacts on the elderly person's financial status that can subsequently affect the individual's future care.

Elder Neglect

Neglect is also a serious problem for the elderly and may be seen in the following forms: passive neglect, active neglect and self-neglect.

Passive Neglect is defined as the refusal or failure to fulfill a caretaking obligation. Abandoning a person or not providing food or health-related services are examples. Passive neglect generally is not a conscious or intentional act on the part of the caregiver. Rather, it often occurs when a caregiver is not aware of community sources that may aid the elderly person in need.

Active Neglect is the conscious and intentional withholding of care an elderly person needs, such as supplying proper nutrition, the meeting of toileting needs, treatment for physical conditions and the use of restraints.

In **Self Neglect**, there are no caregivers as perpetrators but rather elderly persons neglecting themselves. Self-neglect is hardly ever willful but rather the result of elderly persons being unable to care for themselves because of depleted physical or social resources.

The Presbyterians Against Domestic Violence Network (PADVN) welcomes those who promote non-violence in all relationships. They provide advocacy and resources for the prevention of and healing from societal and domestic violence. PADVN is one of ten networks organized under the Presbyterian Health, Education and Welfare Association (PHEWA). Reformation Sunday is the Sunday closest to Reformation Day (October 31), when Martin Luther posted his 95 theses on the church door in Wittenberg.


